

Psalm 25 (ESV)

Of David. To you, O LORD, I lift up my soul.

²O my God, in you I trust; let me not be put to shame; let not my enemies exult over me.

³Indeed, none who wait for you shall be put to shame; they shall be ashamed who are wantonly treacherous.

⁴ Make me to know your ways, O LORD; teach me your paths.

⁵Lead me in your truth and teach me, for you are the God of my salvation; for you I wait all the day long.

⁶Remember your mercy, O LORD, and your steadfast love, for they have been from of old.

⁷Remember not the sins of my youth or my transgressions; according to your steadfast love remember me, for the sake of your goodness, O LORD!

 8 Good and upright is the LORD; therefore he instructs sinners in the way.

⁹ He leads the humble in what is right, and teaches the humble his way.

¹⁰ All the paths of the LORD are steadfast love and faithfulness, for those who keep his covenant and his testimonies.

¹¹ For your name's sake, O LORD, pardon my guilt, for it is great.

¹² Who is the man who fears the LORD? Him will he instruct in the way that he should choose.

¹³ His soul shall abide in well-being, and his offspring shall inherit the land.

 $^{\rm 14}$ The friendship of the LORD is for those who fear him, and he makes known to them his covenant.

¹⁵ My eyes are ever toward the LORD, for he will pluck my feet out of the net.

¹⁶ Turn to me and be gracious to me, for I am lonely and afflicted.

¹⁷ The troubles of my heart are enlarged; bring me out of my distresses.

¹⁸ Consider my affliction and my trouble, and forgive all my sins.

¹⁹ Consider how many are my foes, and with what violent hatred they hate me. ²⁰ Oh, guard my soul, and deliver me! Let me not be put to shame, for I take refuge in you.

²¹ May integrity and uprightness preserve me, for I wait for you.
²² Redeem Israel, O God, out of all his troubles.

TALK SHEET

- Psalm 25 is an acrostic (or "ABC") poem. Why might the author restrict himself to an ABC form for this psalm? What can you do with an ABC or similar form in your own worship?
- 2. What do you think it means to "lift up your soul" to the Lord? How do you practice that?
- 3. One great Bible study technique is to look for recurring words/ synonyms that develop a theme. What recurring words can you find in Psalm 25?
- 4. Make a list of the petitions in this prayer. What do you notice?
- 5. Verses 6-7 asks God to remember. Is legitimate to ask a God who can never forget to "remember"? Why or why not?
- 6. Is this a prayer of a man who is blessed? Afflicted? Or both? Why?
- 7. What do you learn about God in this Psalm?
- 8. How might this psalm help you as you try to walk with God?
